Jane and her family have realized that she has broken tradition by becoming an educated woman and a dentist.

Helping the poor and underprivileged is what Jane wants to do most for her community. PMCF has made this dream possible, and Jane is ready to "pay it forward".

She is going to work in rural Ugandan clinics to do all that she can for people in need.
